## Board Performs Budget “Balancing” Act

Question: What does a Sac Osage Electric Board Member sometimes have in common with a tightrope walker? Answer: They both need to be very good at performing a “balancing” act.

At the December board meeting, the Board of Directors discussed how to balance the need to ensure our electrical system remains safe and reliable with the need to meet our financial obligations. At the heart of the discussion was a \$625,699 (6.8%) expected increase from our power supplier. Power costs represent about 53% of our total cost of electric service and due to this and other increases over the last 3 years, the board was expecting a budget shortfall of approximately \$1.1M in 2018.

Sac Osage Electric has been absorbing increases since our last rate increase on April 1, 2015. To offset the expected budget shortfall, the Board made \$706,000 in cuts to the proposed 2018 Budget and Work Plan. They also approved a 2.24% overall increase in revenue effective April 1, 2018 through an increase in electric rates. This rate increase should generate an additional \$398,000 in revenue.

The proposed rate increase will be accomplished by increasing the availability charges by \$4.00 per meter each month. For example, residential availability charges will go from \$26.00 per month to \$30.00. Residential “seasonal” availability charges will go from \$29.00 to \$33.00. Further cost-based rate design changes involving the addition of kW demand charges have been postponed until later in the year.

The combination of budget expense decreases and revenue increases should allow the Cooperative to balance these three goals:

1. meeting its financial obligations in 2018
2. providing safe, reliable electric service
3. providing energy at an affordable price

The Board is working hard to make decisions in the best interest of its members and believes the approved 2018 Budget and Work Plan achieves these three goals.

## Operation Round-up Awards Local Projects

The Board of Directors authorized the Sac Osage Electric “Operation Round-Up” Committee to distribute funds collected from our members throughout the year to several local and regional projects. The Operation Round-Up program uses the generosity of cooperative members who participate to provide these additional funds.

As members of Sac Osage Electric Cooperative, you can voluntarily choose to have your monthly electric bill “rounded up” to the next whole dollar. The most money individual members could possibly contribute is \$11.88 over a 12 month period. These excess payments are collected in a special account that is used for such special purposes. “This program is a very easy way for our members to help families who need a little help”, said Jim Davis, General Manager of the cooperative.

Please contact our customer service representatives to set up your account, and start putting your pennies to work.
